## **REFLECTION**

"Every year at this time we are asked to escape from the tumult of our hearts, to put aside our weighty cares and leave our wearisome toil, to enter for a while into the chamber of our souls, to listen to God's Word. The Word calling us through the mist of ignorance and apathy to be silent, to listen to the sound of stillness, and to see in the Child born of Mary the Word who became flesh." (Cardinal Basil Hume). Christmas is all about a child in whom is revealed a secret long-time hidden. And it was revealed in the silence of the night in the form of a defenceless, weak, vulnerable baby. Not an ordinary baby. No! This baby was God! Astounding!! It should take our breath away. Normally when we think of God we see him in our mind's eve as a great, powerful figure, sitting on a throne of glory, surrounded by millions of angels. We look up to such a figure, high above us. But here our eyes are drawn downwards to a tiny infant held in his mother's arms. Our eyes meet his and he looks back at us and in that encounter we behold God, not in power over us but in humility and littleness with us, one of us. 'Man was full of joy and gladness; God was weeping, weak and lone. Ne're before throughout the ages had so strange a thing been known.' (St John of the Cross). The central and still unnervingly strange message of Christmas is that God became a baby! The all-powerful, infinite creator of the universe became an infant, too weak even to raise his head, a vulnerable baby lying helpless in a manager where animals feed. In this we see a stroke of divine genius. God's purpose is to attract people to himself and greater love among his people. Not to intimidate us or order us from on high but rather to become a baby, for who can resist a baby? At Christmas the human race no longer looked up to see God but rather down into the face of a little child. Once we understand this essential mystery of Christmas, the spiritual life opens in a new and fresh way and our relationship with God more intimate and loving, devoid of fear. We have a God who sympathises with us because he became one of us. God became small so as not to frighten us but rather to attract us to himself, to look into his eyes lying in the manger or his mother's arms and realise that we are loved. Gaze upon this crib scene and shiver with delight and joy at the wonder of this divine child, God's gift to us.
